Stephen W. Angell is (along with Hal Weaver and Paul Kriese) an editor of *Black Fire: African American Quakers on Spirituality and Human Rights;* the author of *Bishop Henry McNeal Turner and African-American Religion in the South;* and coauthor of three other books. He has also written numerous journal articles and book chapters in the areas of Quaker Studies and of Africana Religions. He is the past co-chair of the Afro-American Religious History Group of the American Academy of Religion. He taught religious studies at Florida A&M University in Tallahassee (where his most frequently offered course was "Black Religion in America"), and now teaches Quaker Studies at the Earlham School of Religion. He is a member of Oxford Monthly Meeting in Ohio Valley YM, and lives in Richmond, Indiana, with his wife, Sandra Ward-Angell, and two cats, Rosie and Pippin.

Berkeley Friends Church 1600 Sacramento St Berkeley, CA 94702 www.berkeleyfriendschurch.org/qhd *Helen Morgan Brooks (1904-1989)* was a poet, home economist and dietitian, a convinced Friend (member of a meeting in Philadelphia), and a member of the board of Pendle Hill and of the boards of many other Quaker organizations. *Howard Thurman (1899-1981),* a member of the Wider Quaker Fellowship and student of Rufus Jones, was pastor of the Church for the Fellowship of all Peoples in San Francisco, a noted author, professor, and university chaplain and a frequent speaker at Quaker conferences. Both were intensely interested in movements for justice in the United States and worldwide.

On this occasion, we will have an opportunity to read from their poetry and prose, as anthologized in *Black Fire: African American Quakers on Spirituality and Human Rights*. In Steve Angell's talk and in our small groups, we will consider these questions: How did Thurman and Brooks minister to people in their time, especially on issues of justice? In the aftermath of Ferguson, what can Brooks and Thurman teach us or remind Friends, as we seek to engage with the current struggle for justice? What lessons might we draw from them that can assist us in strengthening, building, and healing our communities?
